1 in 3 bites of food we eat is derived from plants pollinated by bees. If that's not impressive enough for you, honey and the bee industry generates over \$300 million of export revenue each year for New Zealand.

The Bay of Plenty holds an important place in kiwi apiculture and bee keepers in the Bay are at the forefront of bee-keeping in New Zealand. From huge corporate apiaries to keen hobbyists with just one or two hives, the Bay of Plenty has representatives of all aspects of the industry. Even forested areas like TECT All Terrain Park have an important part to play and recently the Park has become even more significant as the home to the Bay of Plenty Bee Interest Group.

The group was formed in 2012 as way for bee keepers and people with an interest in bees to get together,

swap ideas and learn a little more about everything bee-related. It's a very informal group and anyone with an interest in bees is welcome to attend meetings which are held on the last Sunday of the month in the Park Arrival Centre.

The group also has a small collection of hives in the Park which they use for demonstration and training purposes. This year a National Certificate in Beekeeping has been run at the Park by members of the group with graduates representing both commercial and amateur apiculturists from the Bay of Plenty.
